Background Information on GIZ

- GIZ was formally known as GTZ but the name changed in January 2011. It operates under the aegis of the German Federal Ministry for Economic Cooperation and Development (BMZ)
- GIZ has operated in Kenya since 1975 with priority focus on promoting local social-economic development, good governance and democracy and security stability
- GIZ is working closely with the Ministry of Justice, National Cohesion and Constitutional Affairs- IEBC parent ministry-especially under the Governance, Justice, Law and Order Sector (GJLOS).

Benefits of Voter Education/Voter Information

"Nothing in the world is more dangerous than sincere ignorance and conscientious stupidity." Martin Luther King jr

- Voter education is an important antidote against honest ignorance famously captured in Winston Churchill observation that "the best argument against democracy is a five minute conversation with the average voter," or American writer Arthur Melvin Spander observation that "the great thing about democracy is that it gives every voter a chance to do something stupid.
- The non-formal public education meant to inform and empower voters to understand their rights and responsibilities in the electoral process is an important pillar of democracy.
 - Voter education has specific advantages including:-

- It creates a well-informed citizen who is conscious of his/her rights in relation to the electoral process
- It promotes citizens knowledge of the relationship between elections and good governance and their relevant responsibilities in creating and sustaining a democratic society
- It helps fight voter apathy by encouraging voters' active participation in the electoral process.
- It provides information on the electoral process e.g. the positions available in an election, the attendant roles and responsibilities and qualifications
- It provides information on ideal leadership qualities thereby providing basis for informed election choices

- It promotes peaceful pre and post-elections environment by encouraging healthy competition and tolerance of different opinions

Voter Education Challenges in the General Election

- Expanded elections (six different ballots): the challenge of comprehending the positions and their roles and the risk of fatigue to individual voters
- Explaining provisions for independent candidates, women, youth, Persons With Disability and marginalized groups needs to be clearly explained
- Voters need to be adequately informed of coalitions, running mates, party lists, independent candidates and other issues that were introduced under the Constitution
- Voters need to comprehend the various positions and to appreciate the link between the positions and their private lives in practical ways
- Education on proper ballot marking e.g. through simulations is essential to minimize spoilt ballots
- Technology involvement in elections e.g. poll books, etallying of results must be adequately explained to win requisite public faith and confidence in emerging trends
